[Hannspree Debuts 10-Inch HANNSnote Netbook](#)

For now, just on the Spanish market, of all places

Over the recent couple of months, we've seen a very large number of companies roll out their own netbook flavor, some of these firms having a relatively long history in the field of computing products, while others are more or less newcomers. That's pretty much the case with Hannspree, which is indeed a very well-known name in the CE industry, but mostly for its unusual LCD TVs than anything else.

However, as the Spanish edition of [Engadget](#) informs us, it would seem the Hannspree has just released a new 10-inch netbook onto the market, the HANNSnote, which is available in two color versions (white or black) and looks like a cross between an Eee PC and one of MSI's Wind netbooks (although, to be honest, we might say the exact same thing about all of the other such ultra-portable computing systems available out there).

Unfortunately, as we pretty much expected, the hardware configuration of the HANNSnote is no different from that of the myriad of other Atom-based netbooks available out there. So, beside Intel's already too famous CPU, the device features 1GB of RAM memory, an Intel GMA950 integrated GPU, as well as a 160 GB HDD.

The standardization is also clearly visible in the area of networking and connectivity options, since the new netbook from Hannspree offers Wi-Fi and Bluetooth 2.0 modules, plus an Ethernet LAN interface (RJ45). Of course, as we've come to expect from such platforms, the netbook packs three USB 2.0 ports, a VGA output, audio input/output connectors and a memory card slot that supports SD, MMC and Memory Stick cards.

Pricing for the new Hannspree 10-inch netbook is also well within the limits established for such products, since the portable computing system will sell for somewhere in the 300 - 330 Euro price range (or a maximum 440 US dollars).
